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### Mission Development Officer

Life in the UK in 2017 is truly a mixed bag. For some, affluence brings comfort and the allure of a life insulated from risk. For others, life is a struggle, with over-stretched finances and insecure income. Regardless of personal circumstances, global threats are never far from our thoughts: nuclear exchanges, ecological catastrophe, financial collapse, terrorism.


We are surrounded by paradoxes. We are more connected than ever before and yet find it so easy to become isolated. Opportunity is apparently limitless but makes living a human life in our time a job in itself. We are physically healthier than we have ever been, yet people of all ages and backgrounds struggle with anxiety, depression, compulsive behaviours and social isolation.

Given this complexity, there can be no simple answer. But we rightly expect our faith to make a difference for us, and for others, in our time and context. I want to bring to your attention one approach which has emerged from the work of West Cheshire foodbank and conversations with many local partners. This is the concept of meeting places.

Foodbank has been on a long journey, always struggling to find a way of responding to food poverty that tackles underlying problems and builds resilience for the future. Many of our partners - who also work with those who have become vulnerable - share our struggle. We have come together in a new 'Welcome Network', which aims to establish Meeting Places all over the county. These will always offer food in some way but also an introduction to people who can help with challenges such as debt, benefits and mental health.

Each Meeting Place will become part of a visible network of hospitality, a node of connection for those who feel disconnected. The vision is for all our foodbank distribution sessions to evolve into such places. I envisage Wesley becoming a host of multiple meeting places at different times in different spaces. It's exciting for both Wesley and Foodbank to be part of a new movement which intends to provide places for hospitality to be made real, and

alongside partners that include the local council, health bodies, social landlords and grassroots organisations.



I was privileged to have the opportunity earlier in May to take part in a study tour to Chicago and St Louis as part of a group learning about evangelism and church growth.

I have written an article with some initial thoughts for the circuit newsletter and hope to have the chance to share some of the learning and reflection with you all, in worship and in small groups over the months to come. If you would like to listen to some of the keynote
